**PACIFIC RELATIONS CONFERENCE COMES TO CLOSE AT KYOTO**

Next Meeting to Be Held in China

In 1931

DELEGATES TO TRAVEL

Many Representatives From Foreign Lands Will Come to Tokyo Monday

KYOTO, Nov. 9.—(Special to The Japan Times).—The conference of the Institute of Pacific Relations, which had been in session at Kyoto for two days, came to an end today, the final meeting being presided over by the chairman of the conference, Dr. Isaac Nitobe.

It has been decided that the next convention, two years hence, will meet in China, the first day of the David Y. P. chairman of the Chinese delegation, extended in his opening address on the first day of the conference, being accepted.

In various directions, making trips to China and elsewhere, but the members of the various delegations will leave Kyoto by special train on Sunday night for Tokyo, arriving on Monday morning. That evening they will be met at the station by Dr. Takuma Dan, administrative head of the Institute, and on Tuesday afternoon will be met by the Imperial Japanese government party, and the following day by a "parent" party given by the Emperor. The foreign Minister, after being entertained by the Emperor, will be met by the Japanese government party.

The result of the Conference is generally looked upon as a success, as the delegates present specially by the Japanese government.

In regard to the Manchuria problem, Japan has succeeded in convincing the general public of the necessity of the real position and policy of this nation in and toward Manchuria, while as for the Chinese diplomatic claims for extrinsic abolition, etc., the delegates have converged into the conclusion that the settlement of the Chinese claims ought to be gradual.

The proposition advocating the organization of the Pacific League of Nations, for the settlement of the Pacific problems, was also approved on the ground that with the League of Nations already in existence, there was no necessity of creating a local organ of a similar nature.

**COAL MINE TROUBLES**

LONDON, November 7.—(Rego).—The conference of the national delegates of the Miners' Federation, at which the executive committee discussed the Government's proposal, including the reduction of working hours seven-and-a-half.

It was not suggested that the proposals should be rejected, but the Government was unable to induce the coal-owners to accept the proposals, so that the Government tried to convince.

The executive of the Miners' Federation, it is reported, intends to continue to urge on the Government the necessity of reaching a national agreement on the coal question and a national minimum.

Mr. A. J. Cook, secretary of the Miners' Federation, in a statement said that the coal-owners were extremely selfish in refusing to accept the joint conference.

The conference also carried the recommendation of the executive of the Miners' Federation to accept the general principles of the proposals set forth by the Government. This recommendation will now go to the coal-mining districts for consideration.

A sensation was caused when Mr. Herbert Smith, who was presiding over today's meeting, left the chair and walked out with the entire Yorkshire delegation, because, he said, they had no mandate to vote on any recommendation, the Yorkshire delegates urging that the proposals of the Government should be put before the district councils for consideration without any recommendation being tagged on to them.

**DRAMATIST ARRESTED**
